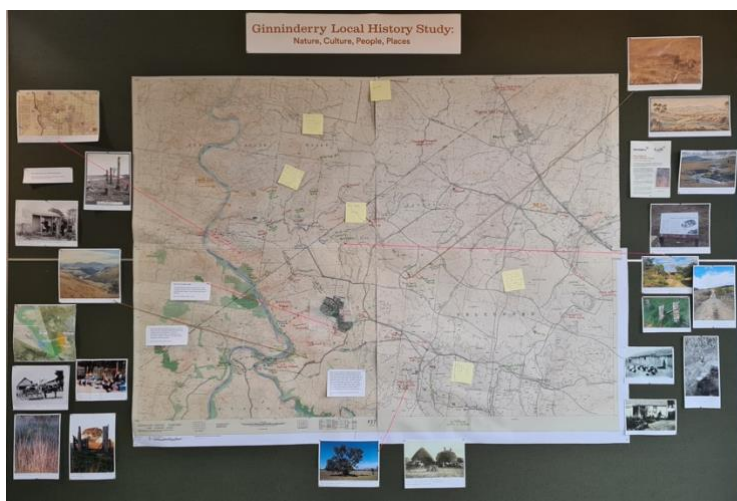


Reimagining Ginninderry:

Interpreting the cultural landscape in a local sustainable development.

This talk is based on the idea that interpreting the cultural landscape of a new development has the potential to meet sustainability goals by encouraging interest in and attachment to the environment, and by supporting inclusive community development practice.

It includes background to Mary's work for Ginninderry and how she sees sustainable interpretation of heritage. It also introduces elements of the Ginninderry cultural landscape and discusses three different outcomes of her work which reflect the process of collecting interpretive material as well as communicating it.

She is a public historian and writer whose research and professional interests include museum and heritage site interpretation, oral history, community collaboration and cultural diversity. She has a particular interest in interpreting changing times and places through the lens of personal experience. Her work has included the Migration Memories project at Lighting Ridge, NSW and Robinvale, VIC through to other local ACT heritage projects.

Mary has made considerable contributions to the Canberra Archaeological Society through her community outreach walks at Old Lands End.
